Donors support life-saving enhancements at RMH

The Ross Memorial's X-ray and Mammogram rooms are in a state of transformation, thanks to the exceptional support of local donors.

The project began on July 3rd. When work is complete in January, the department will no longer consist of four small X-ray rooms, rather three larger spaces providing better patient flow and accessibility. Even more exciting is the new equipment that's being installed.

Currently, X-ray Technologists must position and reposition patients while shifting equipment to get the best possible image. The new equipment will be automated to measure the patient and set itself up for the imaging required. What's more, the new equipment will move around the patient, saving the patient awkward and sometimes painful shifting, and saving the Technologists time and effort required for manual positioning.

Gifts to the 'Defining Care' Spring Appeal are supporting the X-ray enhancements. To date, more than \$85,577 has been raised through the Appeal.

The work underway also includes the installation of the 3D Mammography Unit with biopsy capabilities – another key acquisition that received exceptional donor support from individuals, organizations, and community groups. "I think this is an amazing time to be combining surgery and technology to try to make bigger surgeries into smaller ones, and to make smaller surgeries into minor outpatient procedures. RMH has really committed to making sure that residents of the area can get cutting edge surgical care without having to travel long distances – and I'm really excited to be a part of that commitment!"

Julie and Joshua moved to Lindsay from Ottawa. They're enjoying the small-town feel of the area and are grateful for the warm welcome they've received. Having celebrated their wedding this summer, the pair now has more time to explore their new community and have enjoyed The Farmers Market and the Kawartha Dairy.
